- Reach out to people as more people are in their offices working than traveling during this time.
- Blend high-touch and high-tech tools to connect with people. Maximize social media in an appropriate manner.
- Read a book such as Designing Your Life by Bill Burnett and Dave Evans
- Participate in a learning event, a course, symphony, theatre, or other interest.
- Create a target list of organizations you are interested in and identify their competitors.

- Increase your visibility approximately 70% of the time people find their next job through other people. The Hidden Job Market is magnified by connecting with people.
